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## Away from home toilets: Special needs users

### Who are special needs users?

- Parents, their babies & toddlers
- People with physical disabilities
- > People with hidden disabilities
- People with profound & multiple learning (intellectual) disabilities (PMLD)
- Frail elderly people & people with dementia
- > People with neurological disorders

## Why don't existing standard accessible loos meet our needs?

## Existing provision <u>does</u> meet the needs of many disabled people, but, not all. Why?

- Some disabled people cannot self-transfer from wheelchair to a toilet
- A number of disabled people cannot weight bear
- Many people wear continence pads that need to be changed
- Paid carers are not allowed to physically lift from wheelchair to changing bench need to use a hoist

### What do we want?

## Space & Spacing in toilet cubicles

- person with disabilities, wheelchair & one/two carers
- height-adjustable wall-mounted folding changing bench OR a free-standing changing bench
- fixed OR mobile standing hoisting system
- peninsular toilet with adequate space for a helper on either side if needed
- other details and furniture as specified in British Standard No. 8300

### What do we want?

### Other essential equipment

- screen/curtain to allow privacy for person with disabilities and carer when either uses the toilet
- wide tear-off paper roll to cover bench (for hygiene)
- large waste bin for disposable pads
- wipes extremely useful

## Changing Places Accessible Loos What do we want?

#### These loos should be unisex - why?

- many disabled people need assistance from carers who are often of the opposite sex
- a parent caring for a child/adult with disabilities of the opposite sex
- disabled people are often parents and will have children of the opposite sex

These loos should be safe - how/why?

- from vandalism this means accessed by a key or attendant
- equipment in working order
